

THE STATE OF UKRAINE'S HEALTHCARE SYSTEM IN LATE 2024

The healthcare system in Ukraine continues to face immense challenges amidst the ongoing full-scale invasion. The war's impact on medical infrastructure, access to care, and workforce capacity has been devastating, necessitating extraordinary resilience and adaptation from this sector.

KEY CHALLENGES INCLUDE

- **Structural and Equipment Damage.** More than 2,200 medical facilities, including children's hospitals, were damaged or destroyed. Additionally, Russia has damaged 234 emergency medical vehicles and completely destroyed 273.
- **Access to Essential Utilities.** Attacks on critical infrastructure have left many healthcare facilities without reliable access to water, electricity, and heating.
- **Increased Workload for Medical Staff.** The influx of internally displaced persons (IDPs) has significantly increased the number of patients. Today, the number of IDPs exceeds 4.6 million people. In addition, the war has created an urgent need for emergency care related to burns, traumas, and other injuries as a result of combat.
- **Mental Health and Physical Rehabilitation Needs.** The war has amplified the demand for mental health services and rehabilitation programs, revealing gaps in personnel training and specialized care availability. Currently, nearly 20,000 people require prosthetics due to war-related injuries.

Despite these challenges, the healthcare sector in Ukraine continues to operate under extraordinary circumstances, ensuring access to critical services for millions of people. Our medical team is committed to addressing both immediate needs and the long-term transformation of Ukraine's healthcare system, partnering with experts and stakeholders to build a sustainable future.

KEY PRIORITIES FOR THE MEDICAL TEAM



SAVING LIVES

- Tactical medicine support.
- Establish and enhance stabilization centers for the wounded.
- Procure and distribute emergency medications and equipment.



REBUILDING LIVES

- Create and expand rehabilitation programs.
- Establish pain treatment centers to help patients regain a sense of normalcy in collaboration with the **MOH (Ministry of Health of Ukraine)**.



SUPPLEMENTARY GOALS

- In-kind medical donations — establish processes for effective management and distribution of shipments of medical supplies.
- Initiate upstream projects to elevate the quality and standards of medical resources available in Ukraine.

REBUILDING LIVES

“Ukraine Without Pain” in partnership with the **Ministry of Health of Ukraine**. The primary objective of this project is to create a nationwide network of pain treatment centers to support those suffering from chronic pain due to war injuries.

Through “Ukraine Without Pain”, we are:

- Establishing specialized pain centers.
- Providing essential equipment for pain treatment.
- Training medical professionals to elevate healthcare standards.

By the end of 2024, in collaboration with Ministry of Health of Ukraine, we helped to:

- Open two Pain Medicine centers in Kyiv and Vinnytsia.
- Launch chronic pain treatment courses.
- Implement national standards for pain treatment.
- Develop protocols for diagnostics and care.

Together, we are addressing the immediate medical needs of those suffering while building a healthcare system capable of supporting Ukraine’s recovery and resilience.

In-Kind Donations

Throughout 2024, Nova Ukraine distributed medical equipment and supplies worth **\$6 million** to more than **120 specialized** hospitals in partnership with **Medical Bridges and MedGlobal**.

UKRAINE UNDER FIRE: THE HUMAN AND INFRASTRUCTURE COST OF RUSSIA'S RELENTLESS ATTACKS

CRITICAL INFRASTRUCTURE REMAINS THE MAIN TARGET OF RUSSIAN SHELLING BEYOND THE FRONTLINES.

In 2024, russia — deploying a wide array of combined weapons — carried out **11 large-scale attacks** against Ukraine. These attacks involved more than **11,200 shaheds**, over **1,300 missiles** of various types, and more than **3,000 reconnaissance UAVs**, all targeting critical energy facilities across Ukraine. This **destroyed approximately 65% of the nation's energy infrastructure**, a crisis requiring years and billions of dollars to restore.

More than **213,000 facilities** of various use and 10% of Ukraine's housing stock **were destroyed** as a result of russian bombardments.

Attacks on water infrastructure have been equally devastating: In 2022, russia destroyed a water pipeline that supplied drinking water to Mykolaiv, affecting more than 250,000 residents of the city at the time. In 2023, russian forces destroyed the Kakhovka Dam — nearly as large as the Hoover Dam — and flooding an area roughly the size of New York City. As of January 2025, **4.6 million Ukrainians have limited access to drinking water.**

PRIORITIES OF THE TEAM

- **Resilience:** bomb shelters, water filtering stations, non-medical support for med establishments.
- **Medical vehicles:** ambulances, vehicles for medical evacuation.
- **Energy:** generators, power stations (e.g., for medical stabilization centers), solar panels for schools & hospitals.
- **First responders and demining team:** equipment provided for emergency and demining work.
- **Emergency repair:** minor repairs to damages after missile attacks.

KEY PROJECTS

“THE POINTS OF INVINCIBILITY”

Located at fifty major railway stations, the centers are equipped with autonomous power and heating systems, children’s areas, tea stations, and more. The centers provide daily support and serve as vital refuges during blackouts or evacuations caused by the russian aggression. Funded by **The Howard G. Buffett Foundation**.

UKRAINE'S EDUCATION CRISIS: THE STRUGGLE FOR LEARNING AMID WAR AND UNCERTAINTY

THE EDUCATION CRISIS, WHICH BEGAN DURING THE COVID-19 EPIDEMIC WITH THE TRANSITION TO REMOTE LEARNING, ONLY DEEPENED IN 2022. IN TWO YEARS, **RUSSIA HAS DESTROYED OR DAMAGED ONE IN TEN SCHOOLS IN UKRAINE**, DEPRIVING CHILDREN OF THEIR FUNDAMENTAL AND BASIC RIGHT TO ACCESSIBLE EDUCATION.

KEY OBSTACLES

- **Lack of safe conditions for learning:** air raids that interrupt the educational process (87% of school administrators identified this as a major obstacle).
- **Lack of access to full-time education:** 20% of children study remotely.
- **Interruptions in power supply and internet access** (as a result). According to 2024 data from Unicef, children lose 78 to 311 million hours of learning each month. This in turn leads to career losses in the future.
- **Lack of sufficient technical support**, with 25% of children affirming they do not have sufficient resources to study online.
- **Deterioration of the psycho-emotional state** of students and teachers with 44% of teachers reporting an increase in workload compared to 2022.

These barriers to learning are a result of the war waged by Russia against Ukraine and should be interpreted as a war against human capital. Therefore, we stand on the principle that: **“Education cannot wait”**.

PRIORITIES FOR EDUCATIONAL SUPPORT

- Recover educational losses.
- Assist vulnerable groups of students.
- Improve qualifications of teachers (STEM, English).
- Support decentralization by developing professional training and best practices recommendations for school principals and local stakeholders.



BEYOND WEAPONS: HOW UKRAINE'S CULTURE BECOMES A TOOL OF RESISTANCE

CULTURE IS ESSENTIAL TO NOVA UKRAINE'S AWARENESS EFFORTS, CONNECTING DIVERSE AUDIENCES WITH UKRAINIAN IDENTITY AND HERITAGE. BY FOSTERING CULTURAL UNDERSTANDING, NOVA UKRAINE BUILDS SOLIDARITY AND COUNTERS HARMFUL NARRATIVES, REINFORCING THE NATION'S UNIQUE HISTORICAL CONTEXT.

LIVING THE WAR PROJECT

Nova Ukraine has played a crucial role in supporting this important project that documents Russia's crimes against Ukrainian children through two key initiatives:

- Publication support: We assisted in the release of the second volume of Living the War. The book highlights the experiences of children during the ongoing conflict.
- Website launch assistance: We helped establish a [website](#) that serves as an online journal, chronicling life in Ukraine amidst the Russian aggression.

I AM U ARE CULTURAL DIPLOMACY PROJECT

Nova Ukraine has supported the activities of this partner organization since 2023. This year, we provided a grant for a panel discussion and fundraising event titled "(Theater) is the way".

SUPPORT FOR UKRAINIAN FILMMAKING

Films serve as powerful instruments for documenting both global and personal narratives, allowing stories to transcend time and distance. We are thrilled to have supported two remarkable films, *Flowers Beyond the Dark* and Oscar-nominated *Porcelain War*, which contribute significantly to the dissemination of truth around the globe.

10 YEARS SINCE NOVA UKRAINE WAS FOUNDED

Our team was delighted to celebrate with our volunteers, donors, and supporters. We enjoyed traditional Ukrainian cuisine, listened to exceptional Ukrainian music celebrated worldwide, and successfully raised funds for Ukraine through an auction. This gathering underscored the shared values and priorities that unite us all.

THE HUMAN COST OF WAR: LIVES LOST, FUTURES DISRUPTED, AND THE URGENT NEED FOR SUPPORT



Russia's full-scale invasion of Ukraine, which began in 2022, has killed more than 12,000 civilians, including at least 596 children. That equates to 20 school classes that will never grow up.

Currently, 4.6 million people are officially registered as displaced, 889,000 of which are children who have lost their homes — whether physically or metaphorically — and now bear the status of “internally displaced person” (IDPs). These individuals urgently require a safe space to live following evacuation or displacement, where they can begin to rebuild their lives and plan for the future: look for a new home, secure a job, and enroll in school.

Among the irreparable losses suffered by civilians includes the death of their relatives, whether parents or family members. In response, providing psychological assistance has become one of our top priorities.



KEY PROJECTS

SUPPORT FOR SHELTERS FOR TEMPORARY ACCOMMODATION OF VULNERABLE CATEGORIES (women with children, elderly, people with limited mobility, people with disabilities) of IDPs evacuated from the frontline to safer cities.

SUPPORT FOR CHILDREN DEPRIVED OF PARENTAL CARE AND ORPHANS

In this area, the team addresses the most critical basic needs and supports projects that develop, teach, and build values and skills.

130+ household appliances and household items (such as washing machines, dryers, solid fuel boilers, beds, gas stoves, etc.), kits for learning and creativity and sports equipment for children from relocated dangerous regions.

SUPPORT FOR CHILDREN'S CAMPS of various formats throughout the year.

1500+ children were able to relax and reboot in 2024.

8 partners who can provide not only quality recreation, but also opportunities for learning and development, fostering an active life position as a person and citizen of Ukraine.

SUPPORTING THE RECOVERY, ADAPTATION AND PSYCHOLOGICAL RECOVERY OF VETERANS.

Rehabilitation projects developed jointly with psychologists, sports programs, art therapy, career counseling, etc.

- Publishing a guide for veterans on finding employment in civilian life.
- Supporting a volunteer cafe for veterans and their families.
- Arrangement of a veterans' space.
- Partnering with the **UKRAINIAN ASSOCIATION FOR HEALTH PROTECTION "MARLOG-CADUCEI"** to organize health and rehabilitation sports events for veterans.
- The first petanque tournament for veterans.

PSYCHOLOGICAL SUPPORT FOR VARIOUS CATEGORIES OF THE POPULATION

PSYCHOLOGICAL REHABILITATION PROGRAM "RECOVERY DURING WAR"

Nova Ukraine has already co-funded a three-week rehabilitation program by **Vaad Ukraine** and **Josef Zissels**, helping affected family members.

In 2024:

7 grants totaling \$130,000 to support camp operations 154 families received assistance

323 people completed a program funded by Nova Ukraine



ESSENTIALS OF SURVIVAL: SMALL COMFORTS AMID VAST DESTRUCTION

Daily unremarkable objects are valued preciously as never before. Drinking water, hot food, bedding, warm clothes, baby items, portable batteries, and repair tools are essential in an emergency. They provide a sense of care and hope for those people who lose their homes due to occupation and russian deliberate destruction.

Nearly 2 million homes have been destroyed. Households had power outages for 22% of the year, for 1951 hours. Yet, life is made tolerable with essentials.

KEY PROJECTS

NOVA STASH EMERGENCY RESPONSE PROJECT AFTER THE SHELLING

Team provides immediate assistance and supplies, including potable water, hot food and beverages, baby formula and diapers, basic medicine and pet food. We also distribute basic first aid, which includes the provision of blood pressure devices and glucometers for first responders. Our teams also assist with emergency repairs (i.e. shattered and blown-out windows). We maintain and replenish a stock of basic supplies such as bed linens, clothing, and personal hygiene products for those who lost everything as a result of indiscriminate russian attacks.

UPROOTED LIVES:

THE STRUGGLE FOR STABILITY AMID DISPLACEMENT

Nearly 13 million Ukrainians were forced to flee from their homes due to the war with 6.8 million refugees globally, and over 4 million people facing internal displacement. Over 2,400 Ukrainians relocated to the US in an attempt to rebuild their lives. Multiple challenges create instability such as a lack of housing supply in many metropolitan areas and bureaucratic issues that prevent The Housing Assistance for Ukrainians program from reaching those who need aid. Nevertheless, displaced Ukrainians hope for stability, security, and integration to start over.

KEY PROJECTS

- Placing refugees in free housing from verified American hosts.
- Providing direct financial aid to refugee families.
- Running a shelter in Orange County, California.
- Providing information to refugees, including webinars, answering questions, etc. and connecting refugees with other programs (e.g., Housing Assistance for Ukrainians in California), refugee resettlement agencies, job opportunities, etc.
- Life coaching and psychological help.

U.S.-BASED ADVOCACY FOR LONG-TERM SUPPORT OF UKRAINE



Nova Ukraine's advocacy mission has been a cornerstone of our organization since its founding, becoming increasingly vital in recent years. Our volunteers have been instrumental in advancing every Ukraine aid bill passed by the U.S. Congress since 2022, informed lawmakers in both the House and Senate.

In partnership with other U.S.-based Ukrainian NGOs, we co-founded the [American Coalition for Ukraine \(ACU\)](#), which plays a key role in advocating for Ukraine's interests. A significant part of ACU's work involves organizing [Ukraine Action Summits \(UAS\)](#) in Washington, D.C. which take place every spring and fall, and which are essential for securing long-term support.

Through these initiatives, Nova Ukraine emphasizes understanding Ukraine's challenges and mobilizing public support for policies that uphold democratic values and human rights. **Our accomplishments include facilitating over 500 congressional meetings during Ukraine Action Summits, where participants from 48 states advocate for critical military support, humanitarian aid and services, and policy measures.** These efforts have directly influenced U.S. support for Ukraine, demonstrating our commitment to and success in fostering a strong network of advocates dedicated to Ukraine's fight for freedom and dignity.



- 01** | Co-founded American Coalition for Ukraine, which has over 100 participating organizations.
- 02** | Co-organized Ukraine Action Summits in Washington, D.C. in 2024 each of which gathered more than 500 representatives from 48 states in spring and autumn.
- 03** | Supported bills H.R. 8035 and H.R. 8038, which provided military assistance to Ukraine.
- 04** | Covered Nova Ukraine in a Ukrainian history course at the University of California, Berkeley, in July 2024.
- 05** | Welcomed Oleksandra Matviichuk to Nova Ukraine as an Ambassador to promote and jointly enhance advocating for human rights. As a prominent human rights lawyer, she leads the Center for Civil Liberties (CCL), which was awarded the Nobel Peace Prize in 2022 for its significant contributions to human rights protection in Ukraine.
- 06** | Met with Věra Jourová, Vice President of the European Commission for Values and Transparency, on May 29, 2024, in California to discuss critical issues affecting Ukraine.
- 07** | Participated in the “Bay to Breakers” (12K) race in San Francisco in May 2024 and the San Francisco Marathon (10K option) in July 2024 to represent Ukraine on the West Coast.
- 08** | Met with Viktor and Kateryna Yushchenko — the former Ukrainian President (2005-2010) and First Lady on October 3, 2024, in Palo Alto, California. Our conversation revolved around the defense of democracy and fair elections, reflecting on the pivotal events of 2004. We also discussed the significant strides being made in healthcare and science today.
- 09** | Organized street rallies in the Bay Area to unite the Ukrainian community on February 24, 2024, the war’s two-year mark.
- 10** | Together with Amb. Erin McKee from USAID, we reviewed past USAID’s programs in Ukraine and how the Ukrainian diaspora in California can assist USAID in their mission, in September 2024 in Mountain View.
