My name is Nick Bilogorskiy, I was born in Kharkiv, Ukraine. I have lived in America for nearly 20 years and I want to address you today as an American who believes deeply in freedom, and in the power of people to stand up to tyranny. Right now, people of Ukraine are fighting for their independence. They are fighting for their right to exist. And they are showing the world that courage still matters. Ukraine inspires the world.

Eleven years ago, I co-founded Nova Ukraine in California with my closest friends. Since then, our mission has been clear: Support Ukraine and its people in building a strong civil society.

Today, our focus is simple: Save lives. Reunite families. Provide clean water, restore electricity – and help Ukraine win.

We have raised over **160 million** dollars through over a quarter million of donations in US.

We've directly supported over **10 million Ukrainians**. Half of our budget goes to medical support – from first aid kits to a groundbreaking pain rehab project with Ukraine's Ministry of Health.

As Ukraine fights for survival, she needs every one of us. In Washington, DC, at our Action Summits we are building a thousand-strong advocacy force together with American Coalition for Ukraine that will support Ukraine for decades to come.

Helping Ukraine is not just the right thing to do, it is the smart thing to do for three reasons:

1. Saving American lives. Helping Ukraine is the smartest and cost-effective way to keep our American troops from ever having to fight on European soil.
2. This isn't a partisan issue. Most Democrats and Most Republicans support Ukraine's sovereignty. Because this isn't about politics. This is about who we are.
3. It is strategic. Ukraine is home to nearly \$15 trillion in critical minerals of titanium, graphite, lithium, rare earth elements. These are essential for America's military, our energy independence, and our technological future.

I'm grateful to our donors for their trust, I want to recognize members of our team who made this impact happen and for continuous humanitarian support and critical aid delivery.

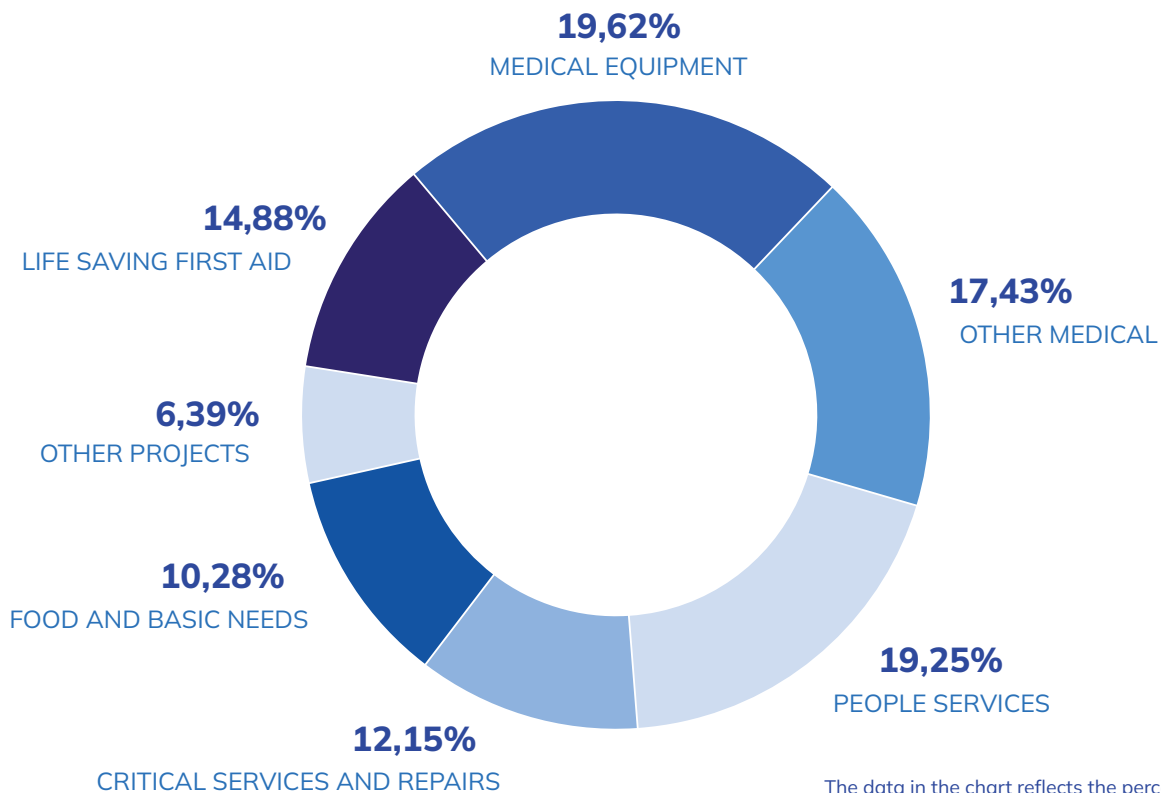

UKRAINE'S RESILIENCE DEPENDS ON SAVING PEOPLE'S LIVES

Approximately 9.2 million people across Ukraine are projected to require medical assistance in 2025¹. The total recovery and reconstruction needs in healthcare are estimated to be US\$19.4 billion over the next decade². This figure encompasses the costs of debris removal, demolition of destroyed facilities, financial losses from damaged facilities, and additional health losses due to limited access to critical care and heightened public health risks. This is not representative of the final figure, however, due to

the ongoing nature of war and the growing damage caused by Russia.

In 2025, Nova Ukraine will focus its medical initiatives on two core goals: saving and rebuilding lives.

Nova Ukraine delivers urgent medical aid to those in immediate danger while investing in long-term recovery through rehabilitation, trauma care, and sustainable health solutions.

SUPPLEMENTARY GOALS

- Strengthening efforts in in-kind donations and optimizing their distribution.
- Initiating upstream projects to elevate the quality and standards of medical resources available in Ukraine.

SAVING LIVES

(Projects and statistics cover the period for Q1 in 2025.)

- We are funding for procurement of medicines, medical supplies, and small equipment for various medical institutions. Working alongside our trusted partner **Patients of Ukraine**, Nova Ukraine has donated more than **60,000** units of medical supplies to over **45** hospitals in Ukraine.
- Supporting patients with cancer. In collaboration with **Patients of Ukraine**, we provided **90** patients with costly life-saving medicines.
- Together with **Patients of Ukraine**, we delivered **30,000** units of aid (medicines and small equipment) for medical evacuation teams and medical teams working near the frontlines.
- Providing osteosynthesis materials (plates, spokes, bolts, etc.) for surgical interventions, with **7,000** units delivered to **12** hospitals in Ukraine.
- Supplying stabilization centers that operate near the frontlines. With **79** units of life-saving equipment delivered for the first stage of evacuations. This includes surgical tables, patient monitors, ventilators, and oxygen cylinders.
- Delivering **29** units of portable ultrasound machines to **29** medical institutions in Ukraine to accelerate and facilitate patient diagnosis.
- Delivering **2** mobile X-ray machines to stabilization centers that save the lives of our defenders.
- Working alongside our partner **100 PERCENT LIFE**, we delivered a set of capnography equipment, an X-ray machine, a ventilator, and pulse oximeters to the stabilization center's doctors.

REBUILDING LIVES

Ukraine Without Pain in partnership with the **Ministry of Health of Ukraine (MOH)**. Its primary objective is to establish a nationwide network of pain treatment centers to support those suffering from chronic pain due to war injuries.

Our Achievements Include

- Opening four centers in Kyiv, Vinnytsia, and Poltava, where people with chronic pain may go to seek relief and professional medical care.
- Training 30 doctors across Ukraine to build their professional expertise, enabling them to share their knowledge and experience with others.
- Developing vascular access training as an extension of the project.
- Supplying equipment for the vascular access area.
- Developing protocols for diagnostics and care.

In-Kind Donations

- We continue to develop the in-kind donation initiative. Thanks to our partners **Medical Bridges**, **MIGA**, and **Maersk**, the Nova Ukraine team received two containers of medical aid in the first quarter of 2025, which were delivered to 15 hospitals in Ukraine.
- The donated aid includes equipment such as: ultrasound devices, patient beds, examination tables, patient monitors, lifting systems, refrigerators, etc. In addition, medical supplies such as examination gloves, diapers, oxygen masks, blood transfusion devices, among others, are included in this aid.

THREE YEARS OF WAR: UKRAINE'S INFRASTRUCTURE FACES UNPRECEDENTED CHALLENGES

MORE THAN THREE YEARS INTO RUSSIA'S FULL-SCALE INVASION — UKRAINE'S INFRASTRUCTURE CONTINUES TO FACE MOUNTING CHALLENGES AS RELENTLESS ATTACKS CAUSE ONGOING DAMAGE AND DISRUPTION.

- During the third week of March 2025, Russia launched approximately 1,000 Shahed drones against Ukraine (for comparison, in all 2024 there were a total of 11,200 Shaheds launched, destroying critical and civilian infrastructure).
- The energy sector has seen a 70% increase in damaged or destroyed assets, including power generation facilities. Power outages affect critical facilities like hospitals, schools, and heating systems, exacerbating the situation for Ukrainians.
- As a result of the hostilities, 138,503 km² — over 23% of Ukraine's territory — is contaminated with explosive ordnance. This means that 6.1 million citizens are vulnerable to the threat of explosive remnants of war. An estimated US \$29.8 billion is needed for humanitarian mine expulsion.
- As of early 2025, the total cost for reconstruction and restoration of infrastructure over the next decade is estimated at roughly \$524 billion.

THE NOVA UKRAINE TEAM IDENTIFIES PRIORITIES IN THE FOLLOWING AREAS

- Strengthen **resilience**: funding for the construction of bomb shelters, water supply and filtration stations, as well as non-medical support for medical facilities.
- **Medical vehicles**: purchase and repair of ambulances, and vehicles for medical evacuations.
- **Autonomous energy support**: purchase of generators, power stations (e.g., for medical stabilization centers), solar panels for schools and hospitals.
- Support for first **responders and demining teams**: providing equipment for rescue and demining work.
- Funding for **emergency repairs**: minor repairs of infrastructure damage following missile attacks.

THE POINTS OF INVINCIBILITY

Located at **50 major railway stations**, the centers are equipped with autonomous power and heating systems, children's areas, tea stations, and more. The centers provide daily support and relief, serving as vital refuges during blackouts or evacuations caused by frequent russian aggression.

FOODTRUCK — large truck which can be used to prepare hot meals for residents of all over Ukraine — this is particularly crucial for cities that (1) have been affected by constant shellings and (2) sustain little-to-no sources of electricity or gas, preventing residents from cooking their own food. The Foodtruck has the **capacity to prepare up to 5,000 meals per day**. High-quality culinary equipment included within the truck allows for the preparation of diverse food items, whether it be meat, various side dishes, or soups. The truck also holds the capacity to bake up to **1,000 loaves of bread per day**. Recognizing this as a unique and essential effort, Nova Ukraine has joined as one of the key financial partners for the project.

CLEAN WATER STATIONS in regions where russia has destroyed critical water infrastructure, providing 1 extra autonomous water station not vulnerable to power outages.

24,000 liters of water provided daily.
12,000+ people who consume the daily water allowance.

In total, Nova Ukraine has financed 6 of such stations, which can provide water to more than

72,000 residents per day.

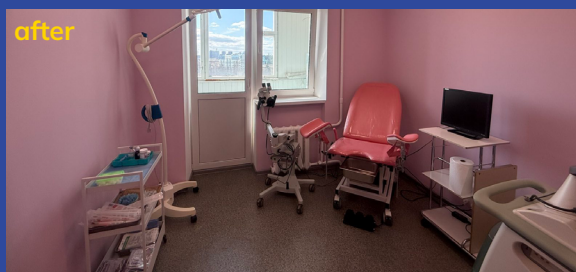

RESTORATION OR IMPROVEMENT OF PREMISES

Together with CO ICF partner **SPRAVEDLYVIST**, the 9th floor of the Center for Motherhood and Childhood, damaged by russian shelling, was restored.

The shelter, capable of accommodating about **600** people, has been rebuilt in coordination with our partner **RATEC**

Installation of a solid fuel boiler for a compact residence consisting of 45 displaced persons with our partner **CHARITY FUND "SAVE UKRAINIANS"**.



BASIC SUPPLIES

NOVA STASH PROVIDES EMERGENCY HUMANITARIAN ASSISTANCE IN CRISIS SITUATIONS

Our team delivers rapid on-the-ground support by providing essential supplies such as clean drinking water, warm meals and beverages, infant formula, diapers, basic medications, and pet food. We also distribute basic first aid items, including blood pressure monitors and glucometers for first responders. Additionally, we help with urgent repair work, such as replacing shattered or blown-out windows.

To support individuals who have lost everything due to indiscriminate russian attacks, we keep a reserve of essential goods — bedding, clothing, and hygiene products — and regularly restock them to meet ongoing needs.

A LOST GENERATION? THE IMPACT OF WAR ON UKRAINIAN EDUCATION

Ukraine's education system has endured severe disruptions due to the ongoing war, impacting the livelihoods of millions of children. Over **3 million children** have been displaced since February 2022, with **4.6 million children facing barriers to education**³. Damage to Ukraine's education and science sectors continues to affect learning and research, resulting in economic losses estimated at approximately US\$9.6 billion. The combination of school disruptions, reduced quality and quantity of instruction and the deteriorating mental health of students continues to drive substantial learning losses.

Taking the impact of educational barriers into account, Nova Ukraine's Education team **works** in the following **focus areas**:

- Long-term, significant impact projects, e.g. Decentralization.
- Targeted STEM education, camps and more.

AFTER-SCHOOL LEARNING CENTERS – “ZMISTOVNO” funded by The Howard G. Buffett Foundation.

ZALIZNA ZMINA (IRON SQUAD)

A unique project supporting the development of talented youth in Ukraine, funded by **The Howard G. Buffett Foundation**, supported by **UZ (Ukrainian Railway)**. Throughout the project, participants develop leadership skills, learn about cultural heritage, and communicate with prominent figures of Ukrainian society such as the President of Ukraine, ministers, renown photographers, and youth leaders among others).

The project provided funding for **630 children** to participate.

MATH WINTER SCHOOL

is a seven-day camp for **48 gifted young mathematicians** from Ukraine. The school focuses on key trends in modern mathematical physics and complex analysis, particularly those related to multivariate probability theory and integrable systems.

PROSVIT DECENTRALIZATION PROJECT: DEVELOPMENT OF EDUCATIONAL ECOSYSTEM.

Enabling successful decentralization of the education system is crucial for having resilient and effective educational institutions during the wartime and the period of reconstruction.

This initiative equips approximately **300 educators** from **23 communities** in Ukraine with the necessary skills to effectively navigate and drive educational transformations. The program focuses on practical approaches to school management, parent engagement, and financial oversight, tailored to the unique challenges presented by the ongoing war.

Pilot program includes weekly seminars with legal and education system experts, school visits and hands-on workshops.



ENGin FOR EDUCATORS: EMPOWERING UKRAINIAN ENGLISH TEACHERS

ENGin is a grassroots nonprofit that connects Ukrainians with global volunteers for weekly online English-speaking sessions. Since 2021, Nova Ukraine has proudly supported this initiative, recognizing its vital role in expanding language access.

This quarter, Nova Ukraine supported **ENGin for Educators (ENGin4EDU)** — a new program designed to address a key challenge in English education: many teachers lack the confidence and fluency needed for effective speaking instruction.

The six-month program pairs Ukrainian English teachers with fluent mentors abroad for weekly 1-on-1 online sessions that combine speaking practice with professional development. In just two months, ENGin successfully recruited and onboarded participants, reaching their goal of supporting **200 teachers** through this impactful initiative.

ENGINEERING WEEK

This popular global program that started in the US introduces students to engineering achievements, applications of STEM and future careers in engineering through activities that develop problem solving skills. This year, with the support of Nova Ukraine,

2062 Ukrainian schools joined this initiative — a record number of schools demonstrating their commitment to the future!





THE POWER OF CULTURE: UKRAINE'S VOICE ON THE GLOBAL STAGE

ORGANIZATION OF IVAN MARCHUK'S ART EXHIBITION IN VATICAN

In February 2025, Ivan Marchuk, a renowned Ukrainian artist, showcased his work in the "Epic Reality" exhibition at the Palace of the Chancery in Rome, Vatican City. The event attracted over 200 international guests, including diplomats, business leaders, and art enthusiasts. While reflecting on his artistic journey, Ivan Marchuk noted, "I have experienced many of Ukraine's tragedies. But through my art, I've looked deep into the soul of my homeland, dedicating thousands of paintings to it". This exhibition highlights the resilience of Ukrainian art on an international scale. It was supported by Nova Ukraine, alongside **Mazowsze serce Polski, Bilokin Initiative, Big Wines, Business Woman Club, and ScreenUkraine.**

EXHIBITION OF CHILDREN'S ARTWORK FROM KHARKIV'S AZA NIZI MAZA STUDIO IN PRAGUE AND BERLIN.

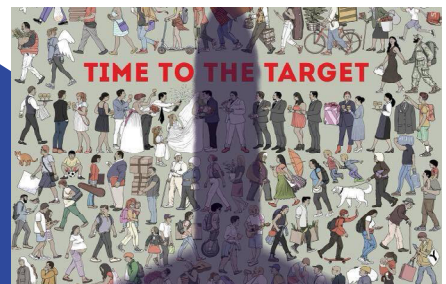
This art studio, located in a bomb shelter in the heart of Kharkiv, never stops creating. For them, art offers a form of escapism from the grim reality of the war — but it's also a way to rethink art and showcase it to the world through the exhibition “Underground Garden.” This marks the first use of the studio in the exhibition, as part of the “I am Ukrainian” cultural project **Underground Garden**. The project also encompasses the filming of a documentary about the art studio's work during the war.



DOCUMENTARY “FLIGHT TIME” FEATURED AT BERLINALE — THE 75TH BERLIN INTERNATIONAL FILM FESTIVAL



A Ukrainian documentary film providing a vivid portrayal of the musicians of Ukraine's National Army Academy Orchestra. Through them, viewers gain insight into the diverse life circumstances of the Ukrainian people as they resist Russian aggression. With **over 3,000 viewers**, the film holds an average critic rating of 7.36 — with the highest rating reaching 8.29.





FROM HARDSHIP TO STRENGTH: HELPING UKRAINIANS REBUILD LIVES

Since Russia launched its full-scale invasion of Ukraine on February 24, 2022, human rights activists and journalists have been recording widespread and ongoing human rights violations. Over 12,654 civilians — men, women, and children — have been killed, and more than 29,392 injured⁴. Approximately 12.7 million people in Ukraine are in need of humanitarian aid, including nearly 2 million children⁵.

With a clear grasp of the urgent wartime needs facing Ukraine's civilian population, our **People team** has identified the following top priorities:

- **Psychological Support** — providing mental health assistance to those affected by war
- **Children's Camps** — organizing safe and engaging spaces for children
- **Support and Adaptation of Veterans** — helping veterans reintegrate into civilian life
- **Evacuation and Shelters** — ensuring safe relocation and temporary housing
- **Support for People with Disabilities** — addressing accessibility and other needs
- **Support for Orphans** — providing care and opportunities for children without parental support
- **Children's Sports Programs and Events** — fostering physical and emotional well-being through sports
- **Passive Warming** — distributing warm clothing and essentials for winter survival
- **Fuel Support** — supplying critical fuel resources for transportation

MAIN PROJECTS OF THE FIRST QUARTER OF 2025

EVACUATION FROM DANGEROUS REGIONS

The evacuation program is currently supported by 3 partners: **BARRIER-FREE FOUNDATION**, **Park and Special Friends**, and **WAY TO LIFE+**.

The program specializes in evacuating people with limited mobility (i.e., the disabled and elderly individuals), and mothers with children from frontline or high-risk areas.

In the first quarter of 2025, **325 people were evacuated** from danger, including 150 people with disabilities or low mobility.



THE POWER OF TWO — A REHABILITATION PROGRAM FOR VETERANS AND THEIR FAMILIES



Working alongside our partner **MARLOG-CADUCEI**, we launched a crucial family rehabilitation project for veterans and their loved ones, aimed at healing the emotional wounds of war and rebuilding connections. Thirty families (60 individuals) took part in this impactful initiative. The project lasts a month and consists of:

- 8 days of retreat, focused on physical activities, trauma counseling, and art therapy.
- 3 weeks of follow-up care, offering continued individual and group sessions with mental health specialists.

After completing the program, several veterans shared heartfelt personal feedback:

One participant, wounded for six months and recently fitted with a prosthesis, reflected: “Here, I felt like a human being again. I want to spend time with my wife and do things for her. I want to help my children with school lessons”. Another participant sought assistance obtaining a driver’s license, hoping to pursue truck driving. One veteran enrolled in English classes to develop his skills for an IT career. These stories highlight the program’s success in sparking renewed purpose among veterans and their loved ones.

SUPPORT FOR THE LEVCHYK SPECTRUM HUB CENTER FOR IDP CHILDREN WITH AUTISM SPECTRUM DISORDERS

At the Levchyk Spectrum Hub, **10 children** from internally displaced families engaged in **489 sessions of individual correctional classes**. These included sensory integration, ABA (Applied Behavior Analysis) therapy, speech therapy, neuropsychology and music therapy. Through tailored exercises and activities, children improved their skills in speech, self-expression, simple physical exercises, understanding of basic rules of behavior in society, and learned about methods of self-regulation in stressful situations.



MOM WORK — HELPING MOTHERS WITH CHILDREN WITH DISABILITIES RETURN BACK TO WORK

We supported a project coordinated by the **EpiAwareness NGO** which provides women with the necessary tools for economic independence and professional development.

- 50 participants received training, career counseling, and psychological support, helping women build experience and overcome their fears.
- More than 80% of the participants report a significant increase in self-confidence and improved practical skills (self-presentation, resume, preparation, etc.) after completing the program.
- 35% of respondents received a job offer after completing the project.



TMS REHABILITATION – SPORTS REHABILITATION SUPPORT FOR VETERANS AND THEIR FAMILIES

Rehabilitation through Brazilian jiu-jitsu classes has been provided to 75 veterans with injuries, amputations and PTSD. Each training session is a step towards a return to active life and psychological recovery from the trauma of war.

HORSE PARADISE — HOW RESCUED HORSES CONTRIBUTE TO THE PSYCHOLOGICAL RECOVERY of “Children of Heroes”— children who lost their parents due to the war.



This psycho-emotional recovery program has supported **25 participants**, consisting of 15 children and their mothers. Integrating equine-assisted therapy, art therapy, professional psychological support, 45% of respondents noted a sharp improvement in their condition, and 55% noting a significant improvement that supports further recovery. Participants highlighted reduced anxiety, stabilization of their emotional state, and a clearer understanding of how to navigate life after significant loss.



CAMP FOR TEENAGERS “BRIDGES”: BUILDING BRIDGES BETWEEN THOSE WHO LEFT AND THOSE WHO STAYED

Forty teenagers, including 28 children of Ukraine's defenders and 2 children with disabilities, were selected to participate in this project. The camp provided a safe space where teenagers learned important skills through creative means: discussions, dancing, sports games, among other pursuits. Through these activities, they learned to be resilient, resolve conflicts, and understand their emotions and those of others. Maria, a daughter of a fallen defender, notes: “‘Bridges’ is the best thing that has happened to me in recent times”.



EXTENDING A LIFELINE: WHY SUPPORTING UKRAINIAN REFUGEES IN THE U.S. MATTERS
